Two issues of primary importance:

Throughout this process we place an emphasis on creating a plan from our communities response to a public survey that was sent to all Ogden residents. This plan as it states will provide flexible options to land owners, support the agricultural community, protect and preserve community resources and provide physical and visual community connections to resources.

The second issues is also a very important one, keeping the tax rate stable. With the cost of fuel, asphalt and salt to maintain our roads going through the roof, the cost of gas for our police cars and the double digits increase of the health care for our town employees, it has been a challenge. The supervisor, the councilmen and the department heads are constantly trying to find solutions to overcome these issues and to keep our tax rate flat again this year.

Reasons for seeking election:

I am seeking reelection because I enjoy the challenge and serving my community. With my business experience I know how to work within a budget and with my background in the construction industry I know what it is like to work with a team to achieve a goal. Some things that need to change for our town is the center of our village. The town needs to step up and help the village anyway we can. Morgan Management has shown the village, the town and the school officials a 5-year plan to redevelop the plaza with some great ideas. These are some local investors that care about our community.
